Note Values

- 12/8: 12 beats per measure, eighth note gets one beat

Rhythmic Patterns

A rhythmic pattern is a sequence of notes that are played in a specific order.

Some common rhythmic patterns include:

- Quarter note triplets: 3 quarter notes played in the time of 2
- Eighth note triplets: 3 eighth notes played in the time of 2
- Sixteenth note rolls: A rapid succession of sixteenth notes
- Syncopations: Notes that are played on the off-beats

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
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
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
